- I receive a message after, or people wait to see me after
- Friends publicly announce positive feedback on social media

- Shares and likes on social media
- Someone who hasn't seen the show says, "Oh, I heard that...." (in other words, people are talking about my stuff)
- When people who couldn't see the show say, "Sorry, I missed it, how did it go?"
- Financial support: tickets, patreon, other support
- Questions from the audience rather than criticism
- When I receive good reviews, a preview or some kind of unexpected publicity
- When people express enthusiasm and excitement about the project
